Did you know ...? Facts about Henry VIII

1 Henry wasn't destined to be king

Henry's older brother, Arthur, was ²heir to the throne. But he died aged fifteen, and Henry became the heir.

2 Henry was an excellent composer and singer He wrote and sang beautiful songs and pieces of music.

One song was called 'Pastime with good company'.

3 As Henry grew older, he grew bigger and bigger

By the age of 50, Henry was in generally in poor health and very fat, with a waist of 137cm.

4 Henry executed many of his enemies

Historians think Henry killed thousands of people, but they don't know exactly how many. Some were executed at the Tower of London – two of these were his wives!

5 Henry spent lots of money

Over the years, Henry spent a lot of money on food and entertainment, building palaces, and fighting wars. At the end of his life, he was badly in ³debt.

What is Henry VIII's legacy?

Henry VIII made important changes in England, and people can still see these today.

In 1534, Henry broke away from the Catholic Church in Rome, and became the head of the Church of England. He did this because he wanted to divorce his first wife Katherine of Aragon, but the head of the Catholic Church, the Pope, didn't allow it.

After 1534, the money and the land from the Church became Henry's. He sold a lot of the land to barons and other important people. Between 1536 and 1540, Henry also destroyed the ⁴monasteries, then took away their land and money too. He closed over eight hundred monasteries altogether.

When you travel around England today, you can see ruins of monastery buildings from this time, and find ⁵places of worship which are part of the Church of England.

What places can you visit from the time of Henry VIII?

There are many places or things that you can visit today from the time of Henry VIII. These include:

Hampton Court Palace, near London. Henry rebuilt much of this and spent a lot of his time here. Visitors can still see his historic tennis courts. People play tennis on them today!

Banqueting House in Central London. This building was once part of the Palace of Whitehall which Henry VIII used from 1530. Tourists come to look at the amazing ceiling with nine paintings from the artist Reubens. These are from 1636, after the time of Henry.

Portsmouth Dockyard. You can see the remains of Henry's ship Mary Rose. It sank in 1545 and nearly 500 men who sailed on the ship died.

Glossary

1 jousting a sport with two people on horses; they carry lances (long swords) and ride quickly towards each other. 2 heir to the throne the person who will next be king. 3 in debt when you have borrowed money from other people, but you can't give it back. 4 monastery a place where monks live and work. 5 place of worship a building for religious services such as a church, mosque, synagogue or temple.


