AFTER YOU COLOUR

Which queen do you think is the most interesting? Imagine you could meet her. Write 5 questions you would like to ask her. Role play the meeting with a classmate or imagine the queen's answers. Write the questions and answers.

ABOUT THE PICTURE

The puzzle is based on a painting of Henry VIII by Hans Holbein from 1536-37. It is part of series of paintings of the Tudor dynasty and it shows Henry as a rich, powerful ruler. The painting was destroyed in a fire in 1698, but there are many copies of it, so this is an image which many people recognise today.

In the puzzle, Henry's image is in colourful stained glass. You can find stained glass in English churches from the time before and after Henry's break with the Pope. At this time, many people couldn't read and the stained glass windows helped them to understand important stories.

Did you notice the special shapes in the colouring puzzle? Read the text to find out how each shape relates to Henry VIII and his queens.

Henry VIII wrote a song and poem for **Katherine of Aragon** called "Green Grows the Holly". Holly is a type of plant which stays green all winter. Henry compared holly with true love, which never changes.

In her most famous portrait, **Anne Boleyn** is wearing a pearl necklace with a B (for Boleyn). This type of jewellery was very popular in Tudor times. No one knows what happened to the necklace after her death.

Jane Seymour could only read and write a little, but she was very good at sewing and needlework. In this art form, people sew with coloured threads to make beautiful pictures. Even Henry VIII enjoyed doing needlework!

Anne of Cleves' wedding ring had these words on it, asking for future health and happiness: "God send me well to keep." After their marriage ended, she returned the ring to Henry.

The heart shape shows that **Katherine Howard** was in love with Thomas Culpepper while she was married to Henry VIII. In the end, she died because of this relationship.

Catherine Parr was well educated and enjoyed studying. She wrote two books on religion and was the first queen to publish a book using her own name.

Henry VIII loved music and wrote songs. The lute was one of the many instruments that he could play.

TEACHERS' NOTES AND KEY

TASK DEFINITION: revise key biographical information about Henry VIII and his wives from a graded reader and recycle vocabulary related to the text. It is assumed that they will have completed the graded reader Henry VIII and His Six Wives, (by Janet Hardy-Gould, Oxford Bookworms, stage 2/A2, OUP, 1996) or some similar input.

WARM UP

In this stage, students prepare for the main colouring task by recalling some basic information about the six wives of Henry VIII. Students can work in pairs to place the names in chronological order and share what they remember about each one. They should be working from memory in this task. After a few minutes, check the order of the wives as a class, but don't confirm or deny any of the other information students remember at this stage.

ANSWER KEY: 1 Katherine of Aragon. 2 Anne Boleyn. 3 Jane Seymour. 4 Anne of Cleves. 5 Katherine Howard. 6 Catherine Parr.

BEFORE YOU COLOUR

Students complete a gap-fill exercise in seven stages. Each section is loosely themed and contains one sentence about each of the six wives plus Henry. Students can work alone or in pairs or small groups to add the missing words to the sentences and decide which person each sentence refers to. If they aren't sure of their answers, encourage them to continue with the other sentences in the section and try to work out the answers through a process of elimination – this is a valuable study/exam skill. It is suggested that students check answers after each group of seven, to maintain motivation. This could be done with the whole group after a set time, or students could work at their own speed and self-check. You may also want to complete the colouring stage after each section – see below.

ANSWERS: Katherine of Aragon = KA; Anne Boleyn = AB; Jane Seymour = JS; Anne of Cleves = AC; Katherine Howard = KH; Catherine Parr = CP; Henry VIII = H8.

COLOUR

This could be completed section by section as the seven gap-fills in each set are completed, or all at once at the end of the gap-fill activity. Students follow the instructions to colour the image; the act of colouring will help them to master the content. Reveal the completed solution at the end of this stage so students can check. Students can display their pictures on the wall in the classroom or at home, which will help them revise the content further.

AFTER YOU COLOUR:

This is an optional task which students could complete in class or as homework. Encourage them to use vocabulary from the book/exercise in their interview – you could set them a target to use at least 5 vocabulary items in their interviews. This task can also be set for early finishers to support differentiation.

ABOUT THE IMAGE

Students read the text to find out more about the image and the "whimsies" (specially shaped shapes) that have been included in the colouring puzzle.
